Fraternity To Celebrate 75th Anniversary

Diamond Jubilee Will Include Dinner and Dancing

Fraternity Lodge No. 262 will celebrate their 75th anniversary January 26th at the Masonic Temple.

The evening promises to be a big event in the annals of Ann Arbor Masonry. The committee in charge has arranged a fine program which will be preceded by a banquet in the dining room at 6:30 p.m.

We wish to congratulate Fraternity upon their wonderful record of the past 75 years and wish for them unlimited success for the future.

Highlights of Fraternity's History from 1869 to 1945

The original dispensation was granted by Grand Master Abraham T. Metcalf on March 22, 1869. The charter members were: Zina P. King, William D. Harriman, E. J. Johnson, Robert M. Price, Willard B. Smith, Erastus Root, M. V. R. Jones, J. G. Johnson, John N. Gott, Fred Sorg, Edward D. Kinne, George Taylor, and Justus Carpenter.

The first regular communication under dispensation was held on March 31, 1869 with the following officers: Zina P. King, W.M.; W. D. Harriman, S.W.; Elias J. Johnson, J.W.: Willard B. Smith, Treas.; Robert M. Price, Sec'y.; Aaron Long, S.D.; Fred Sorg, J.D.; and S. L. Stevens, Tyler.

The charter was granted on January 13, 1870 and the first meeting under charter of Fraternity Lodge No. 262, F. & A.M. was held in its hall on the third floor of 215 and 217 South Main St. At this meeting the following officers were elected: Sibley G. Raylor, W.M.; Charles A. Horn, S.W.; Justus Carpenter, J.W.; Robert M. Price, Sec'y.; W. R. Smith, Treas.; Aaron Long, S.D.; James M. Cook, J.D. The installation of officers was held on February 15, 1870 by Grand Master Abraham T. Metcalf assisted by representatives of the Grand Lodge.

The original regular Communication Evening is recorded in the archives of the lodge as the Wednesday preceding full moon. On March 5, 1884 the regular Communication date was changed to the first Wednesday of the month.

The lodge moved to new quarters in a hall located above the old Ann Arbor Savings Bank on September 24, 1885. The lodge continued to use this location until it moved to the newly constructed Temple in 1925.

The dedication of the Masonic Temple occurred on Feb. 27, 1925 at 1:30 p.m. with M.W. Grand Master Ben J. Henderson, presiding: Chas A. Donaldson, Acting

Dear Brothers of Golden Rule,




The three Masters elect took there obligation collectively and then were ushered to the east. The balance of the officers of the three lodges were given their obligation collectively and ushered to their respective stations.



Ann Payne Savage Has Full-Length Novel Published

Payne, has recently had published her first full length novel entitled, "Erie Kerrelly."
